

# Medical School Overview

## At a glance

- Founded in 1888
- Two campuses: Twin Cities and Duluth
- 29 degree programs
- 988 medical students: One of the largest schools in the country
- Train more than 1000 medical residents & fellows
- More than 3,370 faculty (1,081 full-time faculty)
- More than 17,000 alumni
- \$183 million in research funded annually
- Provide care to nearly 1,000,000 patients

## Research

- Medical School faculty conducted \$183 million of sponsored research in FY 2014
- Top research strengths:
  - Cancer
  - Neurological Disease
  - Cardiovascular
  - Diabetes/Obesity
  - Infectious Disease
  - Pediatrics
- Major recent investments in world-class research laboratories and clinical research infrastructure

## Patient Care

- Nearly 1 million patient visits in our clinics and hospitals
- University of Minnesota Medical Center (UMMC), part of Fairview Health Services, is the primary teaching hospital
- 128 of our physicians representing 39 specialties were chosen by their peers to be recognized as part of *Mpls. St. Paul Magazine's* 2015 "Top Doctors" list

### University of Minnesota Physicians

- The largest integrated practice in the Twin Cities
- Employs more than 790 physicians
- Practices at numerous locations throughout the Twin Cities and in collaboration with most health systems

## University of Minnesota Health

- A collaboration between University of Minnesota Physicians and University of Minnesota Medical Center
- Provides care in a wide range of specialties at hospitals, clinics and in community-based facilities throughout the region including:
  - UMMC: inpatient and outpatient
  - University of Minnesota Masonic Children's Hospital
  - University-branded service lines across Fairview System
  - UMP's activity within Fairview sites
  - Maple Grove ACC specialty activities
  - Ambulatory Care Center (joint venture opens January 2016)

## Education

- We admit an average of 230 students a year
- 60 of our students spend their first two years at our Duluth campus
  - Duluth has a special focus on training family medicine physicians for rural Minnesota and training Native American physicians
- 83% of our students are Minnesotans
- Half of our graduates choose primary care
- Students train in underserved communities through numerous programs including:
  - Rural Physicians Associate Program
  - MetroPAP
  - Phillips Neighborhood Clinic
  - Community-University Health Care Center
